# GET PROACTIVE ABOUT WORK ZONE SAFETY

In 2019, an estimated 39,000 injuries were reported as a result of motor vehicle crashes in work zones nationwide. Fortunately, most crashes in construction zones are preventable if you follow the tips below.

- » Be Alert Dedicate your full attention to the road and your surroundings in the work zone.
- Adjust Your Speed Speeding accounted for more than 26% of all traffic fatalities in 2019, killing 9,478 people.
- » Don't Tailgate Rear-end collisions are the most common type of work zone crashes.
- » Expect the Unexpected Be aware of workers and their equipment.
- » Minimize Distractions Avoid changing the radio, eating, or touching electronics.

### **DO YOU KNOW THE SIGNS?**



A lane will shift slightly toward the left or right of the roadway, but the route is otherwise unchanged.



There's road work ahead. Be on the lookout for unusual driving conditions.



A construction flagger is ahead. Be prepared to stop and follow instructions.



Motorists will need to take an alternate route.



A lane will soon end, requiring its motorists to merge into the adjacent lane.

END Road work The end of the work zone has been reached. Resume regular safe driving habits.

## EYES BEFORE ELECTRONICS — FLORIDA WORK ZONES ARE HANDS-FREE ZONES

Effective October 1, 2019 you cannot hold a wireless device in your hands if you are in a school zone or an active work zone with workers present. The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) will allow you to use Bluetooth or a hands-free device as an alternative.



According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 3,142 people were killed by distracted driving in 2019.

### **TEXTING WHILE DRIVING IS A PRIMARY OFFENSE IN FLORIDA**

Florida law prohibits texting, emailing and instant messaging while driving. Doing so is a primary driving offense.

FLHSMV, along with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), statewide law enforcement,

and other highway safety partners, is conducting a statewide campaign, called Put It Down: Focus on Driving, to raise awareness of and encourage compliance with the Wireless Communications While Driving Law. You can follow the campaign on social media with the hashtags #PutItDown and #FocusOnDrivingFL.

Driving distracted can not only hurt you and your passengers, but it also puts everyone on the road in danger. Remember to drive alert and avoid distractions while driving.
